STAFF ADDITIONS AND CHANGES

Saginaw County. Throughout his 90+ years, he has supported the education, health, and well-being of children and continues to be a strong advocate for children and our community.

30th ANNIVERSARY



The Children's Zoo was the location for our 30th year celebration kickoff. Throughout the year, we have highlighted our progress and growth since 1979 and will wrap up the anniversary year with a formal dinner and recognition program in September 2010.

CAN VAN WINS AWARDS

With MMR's donation of a used ambulance, and the design excellence of AGP & Associates, we were able to retrofit a used van into an award-winning community awareness billboard and functional transporter for our Baby Think It Over infant simulators. AGP Associates was awarded the prestigious Gold Davey Award by the International Academy of the Visual Arts and an American Advertising Federation "Addy" Award for the CAN Van. Now, we can transport all 63 infant simulators, throughout Saginaw County.



CAN MURAL ADDED



Ms. Marty Wesley's Advanced Art class from Carrollton High School completed work during the summer on the 'Children Should Be Seen, Heard and Believed' mural located on the south side of the CAN Council Michigan building. Local artist, Eric Schantz provided his expertise, Dan Leyrer of D&C Painting and Remodeling provided scaffolding, one parent, two teachers and eight students provided their time to paint the mural. The students were able to secure a \$600 grant from United Way to purchase materials for the project.

ROOFSIT EXPANDS & ADDS LIZARD FAIR

A REPORT FROM THE CHILD ABUSE PREVENTION EDUCATION (CAPE) PROGRAM

Program Mission: Working to prevent the cycle of child abuse through education, awareness and collaborative efforts in our community.

PERSONAL SAFETY MATERIAL CREATED



In 2009, the initial design phase of our newest prevention program S.O.S. – Safer, Older, Smarter was launched. The pilot program was presented to over 1,000 second grade students.

BTIO IN THE COMMUNITY

Sandra is a parent who's children have participated in the Baby Think it Over program several times. She heard about the program when her daughters were in middle and high school. Sandra decided this was a lesson she wanted her girls to experience, so both girls took a baby home for a week in the summer. As a few years passed and the girls got a little older, Sandra contacted the CAN Council for another weekend with the babies for her girls. Sandra's goal was for her daughters not to forget the responsibility that comes along with being a parent.

Now one of Sandra's daughters is off to college while the other is in high school. Sandra's high school daughter was presented an opportunity to take a baby home with her high school health class. Even though this would be her third time experiencing the Baby Think It Over program, Sandra insisted that she participate, even with her daughter having to perform in state regional competition that weekend. Sandra's daughter took care of the baby in between performances and her mom assisted as minimally as possible!

PRESENTATIONS TO ADULTS AND CHILDREN IN THE COMMUNITY

1,022	SOS: Safer Older Smarter: Second Grade Personal Safety Program. Hour presentation that teaches basic safety rules to second graders and provided a NEW Parent-Child Activity Book. SOS program reached almost half of the entire second grade population in Saginaw County.
625	Baby Think It Over Infant Simulator Program: An intensive 3-day program for middle and high school students to get hands-on experience of what raising an infant might be like. This program increased the number of young people it served and developed an effective volunteer program that ensures the simulators are clean and in working order for the next class of students.
550	Baby Basics: A program to reduce preventable deaths in infants. A 1-hour presentation designed to educate the audience about dangers of abusive head trauma as well as the dangers of unsafe sleep practices.
1,207	For Kid's Sake: Identifying and Reporting Child Abuse Workshop. A 2-hour session for professionals that are mandated to report suspected child abuse and neglect.
155	Protecting Children: Program to educate parents and the public about the myths and facts regarding sex offenders.

Program Mission: To minimize trauma and increase the safety of sexually and physically abused children and their families in a child friendly environment by coordinating a team of community professionals.

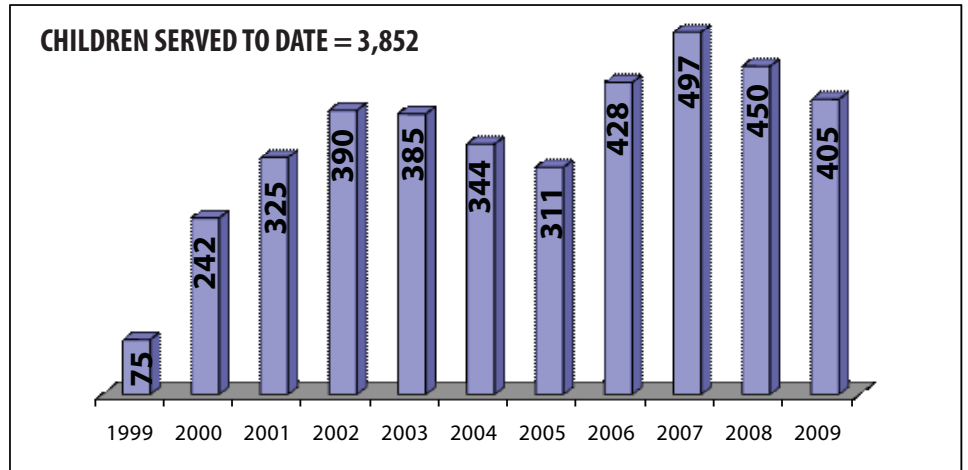

The Case Coordinator/Care Coordinator project was supported by Crime Victim Assistance Grant Award CVA 20690-11V07 awarded to the CAN Council Saginaw County by the Michigan Crime Victim Services Commission, Michigan Department of Community Health. The grant award of \$90,913 (80% of the project), comes from the Federal Crime Victims Fund, established by the Victims of Crime Act of 1984. The CAN Council provides the required match by the use of 1,300 volunteer hours valued at \$14,000 and a cash match of \$22,728 from the general fund.



A REPORT FROM THE COURT APPOINTED SPECIAL ADVOCATES (CASA) PROGRAM

Program Mission: To provide highly trained volunteers as a powerful voice that advocates for a safe, permanent, loving environment for children who are in the Saginaw County court system because of abuse and neglect.

Bringing Hope to Children, One Child At A Time.....

Quite often within our CASA cases, we will encounter a family where the parents are working hard to create a home where their child can return. Here is just one of the over 150 success stories from 2009:

In this situation, where our CASA volunteer was appointed to provide a powerful voice in the system for a beautiful three-year old girl, her father was arrested for drunk driving with her in the car. In getting to know this family, the CASA learned that her mother also had substance abuse addictions and did not have a permanent place to live. At the time our CASA volunteer began, this child was actually spending most days with her paternal grandparents.

As required by the court, both parents entered substance abuse treatment programs. After a few weeks, the three-year old girl was with her mother in the drug treatment facility and then in a shelter. With a multitude of services offered, the goal was reunification of this three-year old with the mother. In spending dozens of hours talking with all of the people involved in this child's life, our CASA learned that although mom had remained drug-free, her other physical and mental health issues have continued to make her unable to provide a stable home environment for this little girl.

During this time (eight months), the father maintained his sobriety and moved toward a more stable future. He has visited the child regularly and he, with the support of his mother, have cared for her for three weeks. Recently, the child's mother abruptly left the shelter after a conflict with another resident and is again homeless. She did turn to the child's father for help. He is currently working with the Department of Human Services to have the little three-year old placed with him at his parents' home. There is no question that these young parents love their child, it is the opinion of the CASA volunteer that the father, with the help of his parents, is more likely to provide a permanent home for her.

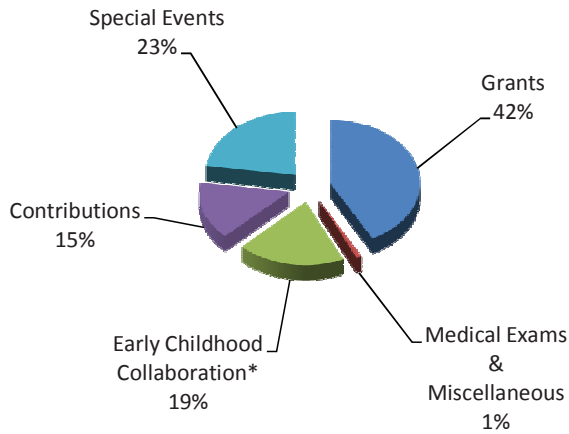

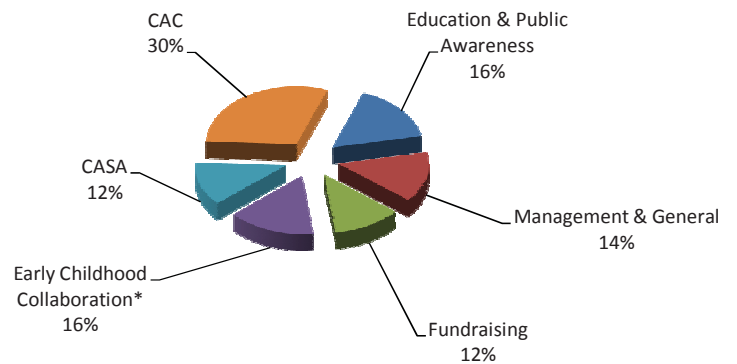
