## Handmade Safe Sleepwear for Infants



Your great grandparents may have called them “buntings”. Today’s grandmothers and expecting parents can find them under the name of “sleep sacks” and “sleep blankets”. They can range from \$8 to \$25 online. Many child care centers no longer allow heavy blankets near sleeping infants due to licensing rules. Parents will need a good supply of these “buntings” to get through the day.



Saginaw Exchange Club president and CAN Council volunteer, **Nancy Corrion** used her talents and investigated how to sew a bunting. She reported that she found a pattern in small to extra large sizes: McCall’s #4236. Nancy happily reported that the pattern took only a little over a yard, and she was able to make one in two hours. The grand total was \$8. What a nice alternative to the heavy quilts many families buy or make for their new grandchild or new niece or nephew. Nancy also investigated the rules regarding infant clothing with the Consumer’s Product Safety Commission. Based on the Guidelines 009808: **\*\*The rules for flame resistance or snug fit do not apply to sleepwear for sizes nine months and under because infants that wear these sizes are insufficiently mobile to expose themselves to an open flame.**



## Parent’s Corner



### Tips to avoid arguments

**1. Give your child choices.** This works at most ages! For example, say, “You have to wear socks, but you can pick the red ones or the blue ones.” Be sure to use choices you can live with and then praise them when they pick, “Good choice!”

**2. Tell your child what to expect.** “We’re going to two stores today, but not the toy store; You have 10 more minutes to play, then we need to go.”

**3. Model the behavior you’d like to see.** Do not argue with your child. Remain calm and do not yell.

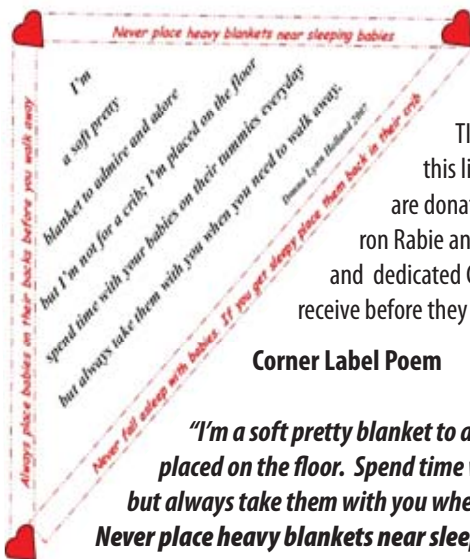
**4. Have a routine.** This will help children know what to expect. Bedtime is after one book, homework is done before TV, etc. Be sure the rules are clear and consistent.

**5. Explain your reasons.** But don’t expect your children to fully understand. Making good decisions takes years of practice and children need a good role model.

## “TUMMY TIME” Quilts and Blankets



### Corner Label Poem

Handmade quilts and blankets are still wonderful keepsakes and are great for TUMMY TIME. CAN volunteer, DonnaLynn Holland, wrote this little corner label. Handmade quilts and blankets are donated by Project Linus Christ Lutheran Reese, Sharon Rabie and friends. Loxie Lund a Forester Representative and dedicated CAN volunteer, sews labels on each blanket we receive before they are given to families.

**“I’m a soft pretty blanket to admire and adore but I’m not for a crib; I’m placed on the floor. Spend time with your babies on their tummies everyday but always take them with you when you need to walk away.” Parenting Tips: Never place heavy blankets near sleeping babies. Always place babies on their backs before you walk away. Never fall asleep with babies. If you get sleepy, place them in their crib and lay them on their back.**

These labels can be made on an ink jet printer and then either sewn or ironed into the corner of a handmade blanket or quilt. Seam allowance is needed if you plan to sew them on the corner of the quilt.

It is imperative that the CAC staff find training to keep our knowledge base about child abuse current. We have been very fortunate to have secured many opportunities for continuing education in this field by taking the time to research grant opportunities to attend state and national trainings.

The Case and Care Coordinators utilized one of our grant sources to attend the 24th National Symposium on Child Abuse and the 5th Annual Multidisciplinary Conference on Child Abuse. Our forensic interviewer authored and received a scholarship which paid for her to attend the Symposium as well. In August the team discovered another scholarship through the Office of Victim's of Crime (OVC) to pay for the 20th Annual Crimes Against Children Conference in Dallas, TX. The Saginaw County Sheriff Department also sent two of its investigators to this training to increase their knowledge in the investigation of child abuse. There were several local (within Michigan) trainings sought out and attended by various team members. This local and national training is necessary to continue to serve our child victims and their non-offending family members in our community through the investigative process and to ensure they are being served with the best knowledge and skill possible.

The team then shares knowledge gained with the multidisciplinary team (law enforcement, child protective services, counselors, etc.) either on an individual basis or as an educational piece for our team meetings.

## ■ CASA PROGRAM UPDATES

### Playhouse Winner

**Spence Brothers** of Saginaw generously donated a beautiful playhouse to the CASA Program to help us with our CASA signature fund raiser. The winning ticket was drawn on August 8th at the PRIDE Family Night Event. The winner of this year's playhouse was **Jodi Persicke and her son Jonathan**. She said that Jonathan is having so much fun already and she is sure he will for many years to come. The CASA staff would like to thank Spence Brothers for their generous donation, all the volunteers that sold tickets and to all the people who bought tickets to help support the CASA program. A total of \$1,733 was raised for the CASA program.



Currently the CASA Program of Saginaw County has 69 active CASA volunteers serving 75 children. A new

CASA training class started October 1, 2008 with nine new participants. They will be participating in 30 hours of training with an additional 10 hours of court observation before being sworn in by the Honorable Judge Faye Harrison on November 3, 2008.

**Mary Ann Haight** was sworn in as a CASA volunteer on April 10, 2003. She was in the fourth training class for the new CASA Program. She has advocated for seven children dedicating 268 face-to-face contact hours with the children. Mary Ann is very thorough and dedicated to all her assigned CASA cases. **IRA GIFT ROLLOVER RENEWED**



With the signing of the Emergency Economic Stabilization Act of 2008, the Senate added the extension

of the charitable IRA rollover provision that had expired at the end of 2007. This extension applies to distributions completed in 2008 and 2009.

Making gifts in 2008 and 2009 from IRA funds that could be subject to tax if withdrawn voluntarily or under mandatory withdrawal requirements may be a wise choice for many. Congress is allowing these individuals with traditional or Roth IRAs to make tax-free gifts directly to qualified charities. The CAN Council would be eligible to be a recipient of these funds.

Key provisions include:

- Donors must be age 70 ½ at the time the gift is made.
- Charitable gifts to be made directly from an IRA to the charity.
- An individual can give a maximum of \$100,000 in 2008 and an additional \$100,000 in 2009. A spouse can give an equal amount from his/her IRA.
- Individuals can make as many gifts in any amount to as many charities as desired as long as the total does not exceed \$100,000.
- The gift may not be made to a private foundation, donor advised fund, or supporting organization.

**Be A Kid Again - Party Idea**
